

## Critical Illness Insurance

Coverage that helps ensure you and your family have the financial support to offset the expenses of a serious illness that may not be covered by your medical plan.

# What is critical illness insurance?



**This is coverage that can help cover the extra expenses associated with a serious illness.**

When a serious illness happens to you or a loved one, this coverage provides you with a lump-sum benefit of your choice of either \$10,000 or \$20,000 in Initial Benefits upon diagnosis. The Total Benefit Amount available to you is 3 times the Initial Benefit Amount you select, either \$30,000 or \$60,000, in the event that you suffer more than one Covered Condition. Payment(s) you receive will be made in addition to any other insurance you may have and may be spent as you see fit.

### Q. What types of illnesses are covered under this plan?

**A. If you meet the group policy and certificate requirements, critical illness insurance provides you with a lump-sum benefit upon diagnosis of the following conditions:**

- Full Benefit Cancer<sup>1</sup>
- Partial Benefit Cancer<sup>1</sup>
- Heart Attack
- Stroke<sup>2</sup>
- Kidney Failure
- Coronary Artery Bypass Graft<sup>(3)</sup>
- Alzheimer's Disease<sup>4</sup>
- Major Organ Transplant
- 22 Listed Conditions<sup>5</sup> (see your Outline of Coverage for details)

### Q. What happens if I have a recurrence?

**A. Your plan pays a Recurrence Benefit for the following covered conditions:** Heart Attack, Stroke, Coronary Artery Bypass Graft, Full Benefit Cancer, Partial Benefit Cancer and All Other Cancer. A Recurrence Benefit is only available if an Initial Benefit has been paid for the Covered Condition. There is a Benefit Suspension Period between Recurrences.<sup>6</sup>

### Q. Who is eligible to enroll for this coverage?

**A. You and your eligible family members.**<sup>7</sup> You just need to enroll during your open enrollment.

### Q. I have a good medical plan at work. Why do I need critical illness insurance?

**A. Even quality medical and disability income plans don't always cover all of your expenses.**

Roughly 1 in 5 people with health insurance report problems paying medical bills.<sup>8</sup> For example, your medical coverage may have deductibles and copays and may not cover out-of-network treatments. And if you're out on disability, only a portion of your income may be covered. Most people will need the means to cover extra medical and daily living expenses. Such costs can include deductibles, groceries, housing expenses, car payments, and more.

**Payments may be used to help pay for expenses generally not covered by medical and disability income coverage.**

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### Q. Can I enroll for this coverage without having to take a medical exam?

**A. Yes.** Provided you are actively at work, your enrollment is guaranteed.<sup>9</sup>

### Q. Are there any other benefits payable under this critical illness insurance plan?

**A. Yes. This plan provides a \$50 annual benefit per calendar year for eligible health screenings/prevention measures.** This benefit amount is above and beyond the Total Benefit Amount.<sup>10</sup>

### Q. How much does critical illness insurance cost?

**A. This coverage may be less expensive than you think.** You can put this coverage in place as a way to supplement your medical and disability income plans. Your initial rate is based on your age at the time your coverage becomes effective and your rates will not increase due to age.<sup>11</sup> Exact rates can be found in the materials provided by your employer.

### Q. How do I pay for my coverage?

**A. Premiums will be conveniently paid** through payroll deduction, so you never have to worry about writing a check or missing a payment.

### Q. Are payments made directly to me or my health care provider?

**A. Payments will be made directly to you,** not to the doctors, hospitals or other health care providers. You will receive a check, mailed directly to your home.

### Q. What happens if my employment status changes? Can I take my coverage with me?

**A. Yes.** This coverage is "portable," meaning you can take it with you if your employment status changes.<sup>12</sup>

Some cancers are covered at less than the Initial Benefit Amount. For NH situated cases and NH residents, there is an initial benefit of \$100 for All Other Cancer.

5. MetLife Critical Illness Insurance will pay 25% of the Initial Benefit Amount when a covered person is diagnosed with one of the 22 Listed Conditions. A Covered Person may only receive one payment for one Listed Condition in his / her lifetime. The Listed Conditions are: Addison's disease (adrenal hypofunction); amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease); cerebrosplinal meningitis (bacterial); cerebral palsy; cystic fibrosis; diphtheria; encephalitis; Huntington's disease (Huntington's chorea); Legionnaire's disease; malaria; multiple sclerosis (definitive diagnosis); muscular dystrophy; myasthenia gravis; necrotizing fasciitis; osteomyelitis; poliomyelitis; rabies; sickle cell anemia (excluding sickle cell trait); systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE); systemic sclerosis (scleroderma); tetanus; and tuberculosis.
6. We will not pay a Recurrence Benefit for a Covered Condition that Recurs during a Benefit Suspension Period. We will not pay a Recurrence Benefit for either a Full Benefit Cancer or a Partial Benefit Cancer unless the Covered Person has not had symptoms of or been treated for the Full Benefit Cancer or Partial Benefit Cancer for which we paid an Initial Benefit during the Benefit Suspension Period.
7. Eligible Family Members means all persons eligible for coverage as defined in the Certificate.

9. Coverage is guaranteed provided (1) the employee is actively at work and (2) dependents are not subject to medical restrictions as set forth on the enrollment form and in the Certificate. Some states require the insured to have medical coverage. Additional restrictions apply to dependents serving in the armed forces or living overseas. [For CA situated cases, coverage is guaranteed provided (1) the employee is performing all of the usual and customary duties of your job at the employer's place of business or at an alternate place approved by your employer (2) dependents are not subject to medical restrictions as set forth on the enrollment form and in the Certificate.]
- [10. The Health Screening Benefit is not available in all states. See your certificate for any applicable waiting periods. There is a separate mammogram benefit for MT residents and for cases situated in CA and MT.]
11. The plan is guaranteed renewable, and may not be canceled due to an increase in your age or a change in your health. Premium rates can only be raised as the result of a rate change made on a class-wide basis. Benefit reduces to 25% by age 65 and 50% at age 70. Coverage is guaranteed renewable provided: (1) premiums are paid as required under the Certificate; and (2) in a situation where the Group Policy ends, it is not replaced by a substantially similar critical illness policy as described in the Certificate.
12. Eligibility for portability through the Continuation of Insurance with Premium Payment provision may be subject to certain eligibility requirements and limitations. For more information, contact your MetLife representative.

Rates are subject to change for MetLife's Issue Age CII on a class-wide basis.
